We are working with The CLPE (The Centre for Language in Primary Education) to continue to develop passion for reading across the school. Two staff are working with the CLPE presently. The units they (and other staff) have been trialling aim to put the best quality literature at the centre of children's learning. Our Talk for Writing approach has children's speaking and listening (think the re-tells that often crop up in class assemblies) as the way in to writing—this approach, starts instead, with excellent literature. Many children have responded very positively.
