## **Governor Visit**

On the 26th February we attended a Senior Leadership Team (SLT) meeting to discuss the Team's Data Booklet which contains an analysis of the key outcomes for children. This discussion focused on Maths, Writing and Reading, Early Years outcomes and the outcomes of the most vulnerable children (those with Pupil Premium, Special Educational Needs and other children about whom teachers have concerns). We were really impressed by the level of detail and analysis that the team have conducted and the understanding of the implications for the children. The team spoke authoritatively about cohorts, classes and anonymised individual cases across the entire school as examples to illustrate and explain their analysis of the data. The discussion also focused on the way in which their management decisions and strategies are informed by this analysis and how the teaching interventions are intended to impact on the experience, learning and outcomes for the children. These discussions will be shared with the other governors at future meetings, but we would like to thank the SLT very much for the all the work they are doing for the children at the school. We concluded that the team have a very firm grasp on the children's progress and are very well able use their analysis to put the appropriate interventions in place for our children - and they are very good at identifying the needs or our most vulnerable children. They are working very hard to ensure that the children have the best opportunities and support to at least attain their age related expectations and are equipped to succeed in later level of education and in life.
