Re: Affording the pastoral work that goes on at our school

We have developed a significant range of pastoral support 'opportunities' for children over the last few years including provision way beyond the norm for a primary school, for example counselling, play therapy, anger management groups, mentoring through outdoor learning and through cookery. These have become an invaluable layer of support for our pupils and often have high impact on things like confidence, self-esteem and mental health generally—all of which, as parents, we would want for our children above most anything else.

As we all know there is a growing body of evidence that this generation's mental health is suffering. There are many theories as to why his might be: we feel our job is not to reason why but to find appropriate, proportional responses to the children's needs. We look to our policies and practices generally to achieve this but we do also offer the kinds of opportunities above, over and above our core offer.

We are however struggling to fund these opportunities and we are going to have to ask parents to help us fund them for their children from now on. I'm afraid there is no specific pot of money given to schools to fund the kind of extra support we are offering and not surprisingly therefore, very few schools attempt it. We have managed up to now by tapping into trusts and other sources of funding wherever we can to supplement the school budget. However the school budget is looking very tight these next couple of years and things are becoming increasingly difficult.

I am sure you would agree, we do not want to lose the excellent relationship we have with some of these practitioners and the easy access our pupils have to their excellent support, when life is tough. Rest assured this kind of provision will always be optional and discussed with parents first and henceforth we will always provide information about the support both in a meeting as well as in a leaflet. I am hopeful that we can find a way forward if we all pull together.

If you have any questions going forward about our offer or about how we might be able to support your child's mental health, please don't hesitate to talk to your child's class teacher, Mrs Bennett or myself.

Holidays:

At the Parent Forum on holidays, it was felt that more information on holidays and their impact on the school community might be useful for people.

Here is the paragraph about impact in the letter sent home last year:

....'the costs are often hidden from view. Essentially every holiday taken makes it a little more difficult for us to get the job done: the more holidays that are taken, the more difficult it becomes. Any holiday will mean that pupils have missed out on learning. This learning will more often than not be part of a wider unit of work and/or will have links to other learning going on in school. Teachers have to work to fill the gaps for returning pupils; help them catch up on missed work where necessary or reexplain a concept, which, in turn, takes away from other pupils in the class. It is common for returning pupils to struggle for a few days to regain their confidence and composure as learners (some can take a couple of weeks to get back to where they were before) and hence learning is directly affected for an even longer duration. Given no child is an island in school and works with other pupils all the time, as a talk

partner; as a member of a group working on a project; in a position of responsibility in class or beyond, as a the member of a sports team, their absence is also felt by their fellow pupils. Please don't think I am over-stating this case. Teachers generally are very understanding and will always want to make the difference for returning pupils but the sheer numbers are now often making this impossible.'
