#### **OUR VISION: 'Life in all its fullness'**

#### Dear Parents/Carers,

I dearly hope this letter finds you in reasonable spirits. While the lockdown has been eased slightly, it remains hard for any of us to predict when we might reach the beginning of less anxious times. Everyone's circumstances are so different and I am mindful that plenty of you will be facing very significant challenges and upset. Please know that as a school we are on hand to help in any way we can and when the children do first return to us, rest assured any learning will focus on the children's emotional needs first and foremost.

As a community you, in turn, have been immensely supportive of us and I think you for your kind words and understanding. I love working in this school- something really quite special exists in the ether in and around this village and the school can't help but be swept up in it.

#### **SCHOOL OPENING**

At present, as you know, schools are set to open on June 1 to Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 pupils. Together with the Trust central team, we are looking carefully at all of the guidance provided and are working towards a plan of what this will look like for our school.

There is a plethora of opinion and information that fogs our lives presently and there will be plenty said and worried about concerning the return to school. As a head teacher, I will admit here that my head has been left 'boggled' more than slightly by the prospect of inviting all my youngest pupils back into the fold- all 130-ish of them. Whilst the prospect of seeing them is delightful, their more limited levels of self-regulation do not bode well for social distancing and personal hygiene. I'd like to think this was done for an enlightened educational reason -I'm always trying to get across to anyone who will listen that the Early Years are by far the most critical, formative moments – but regardless of the reasoning, at present this presents us with a far more significant challenge than taking in older pupils. Those of us in education are perplexed and all we are getting from government is what feels like little more than a

hunch that it will be ok, that our children and staff will be safe.

What can I say by way of reassurance? Whilst I am not in a position to clarify a final plan at present (planning that keeps being interrupted by late and not always helpful guidance from the dizzy pinnacles of intelligence and forethought in government) I can promise we have set about searching for a creative, humane approach that would put safety and people first, over any other considerations. I am not interested in doling you out platitudes like 'we will do our best in the circumstances.' I am not intent on a plan that is merely practical- in the circumstances we need one that is morally sound. If that means learning outdoors for extended periods of time or part time arrangements so we can stagger the number of children on our premises, then so be it. People must come first- including striking that awkward balance between people's safety and their livelihoods and if a part time set up delivers this best, then we must consider it.

I fully appreciate you may have many questions and at this stage we are not in a position to answer them fully but please ask them anyway. We will collate them in a 'commonly asked questions' document and, as our plans firm up (helped by your questions and feedback), we will look to publish this document and our draft plan/ risk assessment early next week. I have also asked yesterday for everyone with children in Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 to fill out the online survey sent yesterday so that we can get an idea about numbers. Clearly plenty of you might want to see the school's draft plan before you fully commit but please fill out the form anyway as soon as possible, even if your commitment is a 'maybe', so that our plan we share is based on a most likely maximum number of pupils. Please contact the school office if you have children in those year groups and have not received the online survey link.

In terms of the plan, there are a few things I would like you to be clear about before we go into the weekend:-

- 1. Circumstances/ guidance/ new decisions come at us thick and fast these days- things may change between now and June 1st so please bear with us. My/our role is simply to plan for what might well come to pass.
- 2. One unknowable at present is whether the number of key worker children will rise after June 1st. This will of course impact on our capacity and hence the overall provision plan.
- 3. Reception/ Year 1 pupils will operate all day in socially isolated 'pods' of no more than 5 pupils. I cannot guarantee they will be working with friends or familiar adults.
- 4. We will look to encourage social distancing across the year groups despite government guidelines that there is little point in doing this. As responsible adults, we will do this and do it kindly. We have managed this over the last weeks to good effect and will continue to do so.
- 5. Government guidelines also stipulate that we use no PPE equipment of any kind (including face masks) because it serves no purpose unless someone is very ill. I am yet to be convinced by the wisdom of this. I would have said the use of a face mask in a controlled environment like a primary school might well be effective. Can I suggest that everyone who can, sets about making a couple of face masks per child in their family, so that we can be quick off the mark when and if they change this advice or we feel like ignoring it.
- 6. As I build the risk assessment, despite careful control measures, a number of areas are still coming our as medium to high risk. I thought I'd better mention this- given I will be publishing it to you. For anyone to suggest that this situation will be low risk is patently absurd.

The government provided some guidance for parents and carers which you may find helpful – it can be found <u>here</u>. The only other thing I will comment on in the guidance at this stage is the assertion that we have no more than 15 pupils in a class-I can assure you right here, Early years/ Year 1 teaching groups or 'pods' will be a great deal smaller than that.

#### **HOME LEARNING**

Of course the school will continue to cater for home learning and we will keep you informed about how this might evolve in the light of the above developments. Please do bear in mind that our role is becoming ever more multifaceted and we only have so much time and capacity. I can clarify here what the maths and English will look like going forward.

Maths: Up to now we have asking you to follow our PowerPoints to ensure consistency of methods and coverage for the children and to try to avoid children getting ahead of themselves (always a temptation with maths) and leaving gaps in their wake. After half term, given teacher time will be at a greater premium, we will switch to using the BBC bitesize maths units which, while not perfectly in sync with our coverage, does at least use White Rose maths resources which complement our approach.

English: After half term we will continue to send back Talk 4 Writing units

Here it is:

#### **KEEP BORROWING, KEEP READING!**

If you would like to borrow books from the School for your child - please e-mail requests to a new library email <a href="mailto:library@minchschool.net">library@minchschool.net</a> or to your class e-mail. In the e-mail please include any information you think would be useful in helping us choose the right books for your child. This could include books, authors and genres your child has loved, and those they haven't!

Once we have chosen your books, you will receive an e-mail with a time slot at which you can collect them. All slots will be on Mondays. Books will be labelled with your child's surname and made available for collection at your allotted time from the marked table at the School's front entrance. You will not need to enter the building or inform anyone of your presence. Books not collected will only be made available at the same time the following week.

To return the books, please put them in a bag labelled with your child's surname and class, then place them in the box marked 'Returns' at the front entrance. On your note please indicate whether the book(s) were from the school library or belong to a class/teacher.

It goes without saying, please keep doing your best to know which books you have and make sure they come back to us once the children have finished them. If the returns box is full, please place the books by the side of the box.


#### **PASTORAL**


## **INDIGO CLASS**

Thank you to everyone who has been sharing on Padlet. Every single picture that has been posted has made me smile. Some of you have been emailing me things too, so thank you.







A sliver of a scale from a dragon's wing (long sprinkles)


The essence of tear drops (tiny sprinkles)






## **ROYAL CLASS**



#### The Chase



#### **COBALT CLASS**


So our work on the circulatory system continues, with many inventive ways of displaying what the children have learnt including this model made by Sachin from lego.
