OUR VISION: 'Life in all its fullness'

Dear Parents/Carers,

Despite being just ordinary folk (like the rest of us) up there in the Department of Education (though there are precious few teachers in amongst them, sadly,) they continue to live the fantasy- that they can successfully micromanage the education system from afar. Of course I realise the situation is very difficult and I am entirely content to live off scraps- just an explanation once in a while would suffice.

In my humble opinion - the prospect of up to half of our children having a chance to reconnect with school and friends, but the other half not, is not desirable. This would not naturally be a situation of our making: whatever you want to say about primary school teachers, they are more committed than some to fairness and there is no fairness, no right, in this as an outcome.

So here find our grand innovation, after consultation with Trusts, governors and staff - the moment you've all been waiting for:-

- All of Nursery, R, Y1 and Y6 will finish their school year on Thursday 9th July.
- All of Y2, Y3, Y4 and Y5 will be invited back for w/c 13th July for 4 full days (Mon-Thurs).
- On w/c 13th July, Fun Club+ will still be running for any key worker children from N, R, Y1 and Y6.

The official last day of term (Friday 17th July) will now be transported through space and time to Thursday 27th August) and will become a Year 6 Leavers' afternoon/evening.

Our priority is to allow our Years 2,3,4 and 5 to reconnect and to allay any fears or lower any mental barriers the children may have developed. These 4 days will be devoted to talk, to play, to different forms of self expression: they will serve a pastoral purpose as opposed to a learning one.

We are hopeful that the first week of online learning has been generally a positive experience and will help see these year groups through the next 3 weeks of home learning.

A second priority is to ensure Year 6 pupils get to sign off from Minch in the style to which we are accustomed. This arrangement will give them (and Mr Bradshaw) the time to finish the film we have been creating and possibly also, by late August, there will be more options open to us regarding how to celebrate safely.

We have more capacity than some schools and are fortunate we can do even this (the Academy Trust have been very supportive in this respect). However we certainly lack the capacity (given the present guidance) to bring back more than half the school at once and if we chopped and changed the year groups on a rota basis over the next 4 weeks, we would create far too much potential for cross contamination. However we were loathed to allow our Year 2,3,4 and 5's to tip into the summer holidays without the chance to reconnect. I realise this causes untold inconvenience to the year groups presently in school but we are going to have to hope you are feeling understanding and able to share the time we have left with those who have not been in at all.





<u>Social distancing please</u>: I am mindful that drop off and pick up time will now be an opportunity to see people again after so long. Everyone has been brilliant and ever so sensible in keeping their distance lining up and catching up outside the school gates. This then is just a gentle reminder to continue being careful.

<u>Make-up of classes next year</u>: With the best will in the world we would find it difficult to follow our normal procedures regarding deciding the makeup of classes next year.

For the sake of continuity in uncertain times and given almost half the year has been lost for some, we intend to keep Year 3's and Year 5's together in the classes they were in and with their same

teachers. Beyond that teachers will decide which pupils go in which classes and will have to be trusted to ensure friendship groups work as well as they can and class dynamics work. We will look to set in motion ways of working next year that allow cohorts to work together and mix more regularly- this to offset some of the concerns around this. Please send in any questions and concerns to the school office- (subject: 'make-up of classes'). They will relay them on to myself and we will do our best to answer them as well as providing you with an FAQ sheet before long.

It is Midsummer's Eve this weekend and, hopefully, the return of some warmer weather thereafter. Thank you for all the support and encouragement you have given us recently - it is much appreciated.

LOCAL HISTORY GROUP SEEKING RECORDINGS OF MEMORIES & FEELINGS ABOUT THE CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC

Siân Wyn-Jones wanted to send this message out to Minchinhampton children and parents/carers about collating the thoughts, feelings and memories of the people of the Parish:

If you live or work in the Parish of Minchinhampton and you think this is a good idea, please record your memories/feelings about the pandemic crisis. We marvel at the photographs and records of life in the past and we forget that our experiences today will become another generation's history to read. This is for people of all ages - it would be really good to get the views of school age children too.

So we ought to collate our thoughts, feelings, experiences of the current pandemic crisis - this could be anything: It could relate to your personal experience, that of your family, possibly being ill with Covid-19 or something else, how you spent your time, your work or school life, how you coped with food, how your neighbours coped, the community near to you, the country at large, weddings or holidays cancelled, your feelings about local, regional or Government initiatives or issues, your thoughts about the different stages of the lock down and the future, what has been good, what has been bad, VE Day etc. etc........Please record your bit of history - hand write or print it out, include photographs either inserted in the document or separately. So that your thoughts will have some sort of context in the future, please include your name, age and an idea of where in the Parish you live - perhaps the road you live in. You can be anonymous if you wish. They may of course be edited in the future.

Assumpta at The Kitchen in the High Street in Minchinhampton has kindly agreed to collect them in (if you can, please use a plastic wallet). She has a box for you to put them in. I will file them in some sort of order, maybe by age, and then hand them over eventually to the Local History Group as a record of what the people of this Parish experienced. As this is still ongoing, there is no deadline at the moment and you can put in two lots of your memories - one now and one later on, but please start writing things down before the memories of the build up to the lock down and the early days fade. *Thank you.*

GOOGLE CLASSROOM ONLINE LEARNING UPDATE

Thanks to all children, parents/carers and staff for this week's launch of our all new online google classroom! We appreciate there are queries and things that will need ironing out over the next week or so - sincere thanks for bearing with us so far and all efforts being taken to get the children joining together in these live sessions. The online learning team have put together the following handy hints which we hope will be of help, and please feel free to be in touch via class e-mail addresses with any queries that might come up this week and beyond.

- Pupils need to have a valid @minchschool.net e-mail address to attend meetings. These are available from the school office upon completion of the consent form.
- Pupils need to be enrolled in their Google Classroom as a student using the guidance and class codes provided by the teachers. The school office has a copy of these codes. This enrollment process only needs to happen once.
- For security reasons, invites to meetings will take place 5 minutes before the meeting is due to take place so that a member of staff is the first one present in the meeting (and is the host) and can greet the children as they join.
- Invitations to meetings will be sent to **pupils'** e-mail inboxes. Please ensure the inbox is open and awaiting the invitation in good time.
- Any accounts that are not @minchschool.net domain will be removed before next week's meetings take place.
- Please take the time to review our <u>online safety guidance on the</u> <u>school website</u> with your child before the next round of meetings so pupils know what to share and what not to share online and how to conduct themselves in a safe manner. They have all had e-safety input at regular intervals so this should be more of a 'refresher' for them than anything else.

Opening hours: 8am to 6pm – Monday to Friday & 10am to 4pm – Saturday and Sunday

Updated handwashing advice: It is essential that everyone washes their hands more often, using soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Hand washing with soap employs mechanical action that loosens bacteria and viruses from the skin, rinsing them into the drain. Drying hands afterwards makes the skin less hospitable to the virus. Hand sanitiser can be effective if soap is not available or the situation makes using soap less feasible (i.e. when outside) but using hand sanitiser provides none of the virus-destroying friction that rubbing your hands together and rinsing with water provides. The e-Bug project is led by Public Health England and has a dedicated webpage for learning resources on hand washing and respiratory hygiene. E-Bug has published posters on hand hygiene, and covering coughs and sneezes, to display in bathrooms, classrooms and shared spaces.
