OUR VISION: 'Life in all its fullness'

Dear Parents/Carers,

The thought that our year is sliding to an end is a faintly ludicrous thought. It's another 'check yourself mid-sentence' moment; another ask yourself again, 'How has it come to this?' It is all, certainly, rather strange.

In some ways our lives in school (and certainly mine) have not been hugely altered. Our day jobs involve a fair amount of organisation; of coordinating the movement and placing of large numbers of young people in as safe and happy a way as we can muster: this then has been a variation on that theme, albeit a rather complicated variation. In most other ways though all our lives have been flipped upside down; not all in a negative direction but enough to cause us all discombobulation. I think we underestimate the fatigue and emotional strain a change in routine can cause and this was one heck of a change. As things start to look and feel more normal than they did, we must stay very mindful of those for whom the virus has had far more life altering or tragic consequences.

From the start we have been keen at school to explore/ encourage any opportunities that the situation presented and this remains our mindset. We know there have been lessons to be learnt from the experiences we have had in school and we want to hang onto the best of them. A revitalised focus on the emotional wellbeing of our children would be a positive outcome as would a curriculum with enough heart and breathing space that it better empowers a love of learning. I refer you here to John O'Donahue, 'Sometimes the so-called 'facts of a situation' actually tell us little or nothing about the heart of an

experience...If we were to describe our life strictly in terms of its factual truth, most of its interesting, complex and surprising dimensions would remain unmentioned.'

Miss Tonner and I have been gradually adjusting the Covid risk assessment on the website for the purposes of the final week. I will put the latest version on the website this weekend and promise for it to be in its final form by next Friday. We will also send information out in a more palatable form early next week, including an FAQ. Now that the government guidance has arrived for the Autumn, we are also in a position to start planning for this next stage. I was especially grateful for nuggets of wisdom like this one, '..planning should be informed by an assessment of pupils' starting points and addressing the gaps in their knowledge and skills.' Now I understand how this teaching thing works. One aspect which was mooted a while back was 'class sized bubbles' who would need to keep as separate from each other as possible and sure enough, this is now in the guidance.

Anyway onward and upward - and enjoy the weekend.

The children have been making some Natural Mandala designs. They have also been busy making videos to promote their wizard schools. On Monday when it was really windy, they also made and flew kites.









HOME LEARNING NEWS







LATEST GOVERNMENT UPDATE

Department for Education's plans for all children and young people to return to full-time education at the start of the autumn term:

The Secretary of State for Education, Gavin Williamson, announced our plans for all children and young people to return to full-time education at the start of the autumn term in Parliament today.

The DfE have published the supporting guidance that provides schools, colleges and nurseries with the details to plan for a full return. The guidance has been developed in close consultation with sector stakeholders and medical experts from Public Health England.

Nurseries and other early years providers, including childminders, have already been welcoming back children of all ages since 1 June, with a range of protective measures in place. From 20 July, restrictions on group sizes for nurseries, childminders and other early years providers will be lifted, increasing capacity for more children to return, as set out in the updated guidance.

The schools guidance sets out a range of measures to protect children and staff. This guidance applies to all mainstream schools, alternative provision, independent schools and boarding schools and sets out advice on how you can minimise contact and mixing. Separate guidance has also been published for special schools.

The DfE have also published guidance for parents and carers on the plans for the autumn term to help reassure them about what to expect for their children.

Handwashing advice

It is essential that everyone washes their hands more often, using soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Hand washing with soap employs mechanical action that loosens bacteria and viruses from the skin, rinsing them into the drain. Drying hands afterwards makes the skin less hospitable to the virus. Hand sanitiser can be effective if soap is not available or the situation makes using soap less feasible (i.e. when outside) but using hand sanitiser provides none of the virus-destroying friction that rubbing your hands together and rinsing with water provides. **The latest guidance and video on hand washing can be found** here

The e-Bug project is led by Public Health England and has a dedicated webpage for learning resources on hand washing and respiratory hygiene.
